### **Enriching Lives Since 1921!**

n January 8, 1921, a small group of committed citizens recognized a community need and opened the first public library in what is now Annapolis' City Hall. Opened for three days a week for two hours a day, the original collection was completely donated and totaled about 2,000 books.

Since then, Anne Arundel County Public Library (AACPL) has grown to 16 branches boasting more than one million items, including books, movies and music. Eliza Suydam, our first librarian, surely couldn't have imagined what modern libraries have

become – community hubs for education, enrichment and inspiration.

As we mark our centennial, we'll be celebrating with special events, programs and surprises. The kickoff event, a special virtual birthday storytime, launches a year of recognizing our history, customers, staff and impact in the community. Visit page 5 for details. Thanks to support from our Library Foundation, for the first time ever, we are mailing this newsletter to every household in the county.

While we continue to find ourselves living in unprecedented times, the library remains committed to adapting our service to fit your needs. We are proud to offer our expert assistance in person, online and by phone to meet the needs of all our

Our contactless curbside pickup service continues to be popular with customers of all ages. Simply reserve an item through our catalog, wait for the email letting you know it's available, text us when you've arrived at the library and we'll bring your items to the pickup table for you. The service is available Monday-Thursday from 10 a.m. to noon and 3-6 p.m. It's also available Friday and Saturday from 10 a.m. to noon and 2-4 p.m. Some branches offer Sunday service as well from 1-5 p.m. You can even pick up print jobs with this service. All branches are also open for appointments to browse the shelves, use a computer or get in person help from library staff. Call your local branch to set one up. Some branches offer limited walk up appointments. You can find a list of phone numbers for all branches on the back cover of this newsletter, or at www.aacpl.net/location.

In an effort to help bridge the digital divide, AACPL recently started loaning out Chromebook and Wi-Fi hotspot bundles. These kits, which can be checked out for seven days, feature a new Chromebook and a Wi-Fi hotspot with unlimited data. The program is made possible through financial support provided by the Library Foundation.

While the future remains uncertain, you can count on your library to adapt to changing times, deliver top-notch service and





# Every CHKLD Ready to READ®



Early literacy programs for babies and young children use songs, rhymes and playtime to build early reading skills.

Anne Arundel County Public Library (AACPL) is committed to providing parents and caregivers with the tools to help their young children get ready to read. Through the nationally-renowned Every Child Ready to Read initiative, libraries can have an even greater impact on early literacy through an approach that focuses on educating parents and caregivers. The program advocates parents and caregivers talk, write, read, play and sing with their child.

While AACPL had been holding these programs weekly at all branches, we've moved them to Facebook Live (see page 10) on the advice of public

health officials. Please visit *aacpl.net* for details on restarting these programs in person.

#### **EVERY CHILD READY TO READ PROGRAMS:**

- BABIES IN BLOOM: For babies birth to 18 months.
- PRESCHOOL STORYTIME: For children ages 3-5.
- FAMILY STORYTIME: For families with children ages 5 and younger.
- BILINGUAL STORYTIME: Children build ready to read skills in English and Spanish.

#### FIVE PRACTICES OF EARLY LITERACY

These five early literacy practices will help every child develop the foundation for reading, listening, writing and learning for a lifetime.

**TALKING** with children is one of the best ways to help them learn new words and to learn about language and

**SINGING** and rhyming are fun wavs for children to learn about language.

**READING** together is the most important way to help children get ready to read. Kids who have fun being read to are more likely to want to learn to read themselves.

**WRITING** and reading go together. Scribbling and writing help children learn that the written words stand for spoken language.

PLAYING helps children learn about the world, express themselves and put ideas into words. Playing also helps children understand that spoken and written words stand for real things and emotions.

# 1,000 Books Before KINDERGARTEN

The 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten challenge encourages families and caregivers to read 1,000 books with their children before they enter kindergarten. Reading aloud to children from birth helps strengthen language skills and build vocabulary two important tools for learning to read.

Keep track of the reading you've done on the Beanstack app or with the logs provided by the library. Earn stickers and prizes along the way. When you get all the way to 1,000 you'll receive a new book to take home – and keep!

# STER ACTIVITY Make a Paper Mars Helicopter

#### For ages 6 -11

#### **MATERIALS:**

Scissors

- Blank paper (optional)
- Mars Rover Template
- Pencil or pen (optional)

#### **PROCEDURES:**

- 1. Cut out the helicopter. Be sure to cut along the dashed lines.
- 2. Fold along the solid lines. The propeller blades, A and B, should be folded in opposite directions. The X and Y panels fold towards the center and Z is folded upward.
- 3. Do a test flight! Stand up and hold the helicopter by its body. Raise it as high as you can. Now, drop it! What do you observe? Which way did the blades turn? Does it fall fast or
- 4. Experiment! Make a change to your helicopter. Try changing the shape of the blades, or folding the bottom up more. How did that change the performance of your helicopter?
- 5. Try a challenge! Can you think of a way to make your helicopter blades turn faster or

Tip! To make another helicopter, make a sketch of the template on a blank piece of paper and cut it out. Be sure to include the dashed and solid lines as a guide.

#### Say Nothing by Patrick Radden Keefe

Wednesday, December 16 at 7 PM

In December 1972, Jean McConville, a thirty-eight-yearold mother of ten, was dragged from her Belfast home by masked intruders, her children clinging to her legs. They never saw her again. Her abduction was one of the most notorious episodes of the vicious conflict known as *The Troubles*. Patrick Radden Keefe's mesmerizing book on the bitter conflict in Northern Ireland and its aftermath uses

the McConville case as a starting point for the tale of a society wracked by a violent guerrilla war, a war whose consequences have never been reckoned with.



#### **Transit** by Anna Seghers

Anna Seghers's *Transit* is an existential, political and literary thriller that explores the agonies of boredom, the vitality of storytelling and the plight of the exile with extraordinary compassion and insight. Having escaped in 1937 from a Nazi concentration camp in Germany and later a camp in Rouen, the nameless 27 year-old German narrator of Seghers's multilayered masterpiece ends up in the dusty seaport of

Marseille. Along the way he is asked to deliver a letter to a man named Weidel in Paris and discovers Weidel has committed suicide, leaving behind a suitcase containing letters and the manuscript of a novel.



#### The British Are Coming by Rick Atkinson

From the battles at Lexington and Concord in spring 1775 to those at Trenton and Princeton in winter 1777, American militiamen and then the ragged Continental Army take on the world's most formidable fighting force. It is a gripping saga alive with astonishing characters: Henry Knox, the former bookseller with an uncanny understanding of artillery; Nathanael Greene, the blue-eyed bumpkin who becomes a

brilliant battle captain; Benjamin Franklin, the self-made man who proves to be the wiliest of diplomats and George Washington, the commander in chief who learns the difficult art of leadership when the war seems all but lost.


Have really enjoyed the events online during this time. Glad to have access to the public computers again, as well as access to printing.
